CONVOY PROCEDURE

1. Fuel tanks must be filled prior to start of trip.
2. Before moving off from a designated departure point the trip leader will appoint a tail-end charlie.
3. At **All** turn-offs, vehicles shall wait until the following vehicle is aware of the former's intention. Periodical checks for the following vehicle must be made as per convoy procedure.
4. Persons leaving the club convoy **MUST** notify the trip leader and if possible give details of their intentions.
5. No vehicle in the convoy is to pass the lead vehicle.
6. When travelling in convoy on the open road, the distance between vehicles shall not be less than 6 vehicle lengths, and keep the vehicle behind in sight at reasonable intervals.
7. At nature stops the rule to be followed is ladies to the left - gents to the right.
8. In recovery procedures to avoid injury to personnel the drivers of the vehicles involved shall ensure that the immediate area is cleared.
9. All persons travelling in convoy must be inside a vehicle

CODE OF ETHICS

1. Obey restriction on use of public lands. Respect national parks and other conservation areas, (i.e. Calm, Water Authority, Fire Authorities).
2. Obtain permission before driving on private land. Leave livestock alone and gates as found.
3. Keep to existing tracks where possible.
4. There shall be no deliberate destruction of trees, shrubs or wildlife. Respect our wildlife, stop, look and observe but never chase animals.
5. Use a well worn campsite to minimise impact on the environment.
6. No firearms to be displayed or used in campsite or prohibited areas.
7. No unofficial competition or displays of "4WDing" shall take place during trips without permission of the trip leader.
8. At club functions members shall obey verbal instructions and visual signs erected by the organisers.
9. Drive very slowly within camp area.
10. When answering the calls of nature, members are asked to take the shovel and bury the result at all times, Ladies are respectfully requested to dispose of their paper hygienically. (i.e. rubbish container or campfire).
11. Keep the environment clean. Be prepared to carry out all the rubbish you take into unserviced areas.
12. All members are requested to comply with the above codes.

Willow Springs Trip, WA Labour Day long weekend, 1 – 4 March 2019

Introduction

The Willow Springs campsite is located in East Nannup Forest, 23 km from Nannup or 35 km from Bridgetown, on Brockman Highway, to the unsealed Gold Gully Road turnoff and then further 5 km on Gold Gully Road. This beautiful little place, secluded and set among the tall karri and jarrah trees is hidden away from all except casual Bibbulmun Track walkers or Munda Bididi cyclists (both tracks pass by the campsite), and an occasional vehicle that passes by.

Camping is free and dogs are allowed. Two fire pits (no fires were allowed during our stay, unfortunately), two picnic benches, and a recently completed bush toilet and the walkers' shelter with a water tank, are the only amenities in the camp. There is enough room for about a dozen caravans.

The campsite is surrounded by unsealed logging tracks, providing ample opportunity for exploring the area by car. Other activities are bushwalking and cycling, as well as kayaking on Blackwood River or in Donnelly River village dam.

There is no mobile phone coverage in the camp and one has to drive closer to either Nannup or Bridgetown to get connection.

Friday, 1 March

The trip for which only two couples signed initially, saw eight couples taking part: Sue and David, Kerri and Steve, Debbie and Paul Brophy, Leslie and Bob, Jenny and Tony, Mirella and Paul Di Giorgio, Allison and Allan, and Audrey and Vlado.

The arrival at the campsite was planned for Friday. With the Nannup Music Festival happening over the weekend, there was a chance that the campsite becomes more crowded than one would hope for. Fortunately, Sue and David arrived on Thursday and watched out that the rest of us had a place to camp.

Audrey and Vlado arrived at noon (just around Friday midday) while Kerri and Steve arrived an hour later followed by another caravanning couple, Sue and Don (not WW members). A little bit later, Debbie and Paul reached the camp, followed by Leslie and Bob who had left the camper trailer behind and were pitching their trusted tent instead. Jenny and Tony were the last to arrive during the day.

As members were busy setting up their chairs, tables and other camping essentials, few went into the surrounding bush for a bit of walking and exploring before the happy hour. It was a beautiful day, warm enough for March flies to come out looking for a bite. After the sunset it became a bit chilly and, after dinner, some campers disappeared in their enclosures to seek warmth under the blankets while the braver ones continued with the conversation until a little bit later, but not too late.

Alison and Allan arrived around 9 p.m. and parked their caravan in the middle of the camp, leaving the final adjustments to be done in the daylight.

Saturday, 2 March

At around 10 a.m. Mirella and Paul arrived, just as the convoy of six was about to leave for a drive, so we waited until Mirella and Paul had set up their caravan and were able to join us. Sue and David went up the road on their own, to catch the elusive Telstra signal.

The day plan was to wander around the area and follow the numerous tracks through the forest. Kerri and Steve led the convoy of now seven cars through the maze of forestry tracks. Our first stop was the Donnelly River timber mill village – Donnelly River Mill, or Donnelly River Village as it is referred to.

The old steam timber mill, heritage listed and currently owned by the State Government, still stands, but just. The timber structures had been decaying since the mill stopped operation in 1978 and Bunnings Brothers handed the mill, with all the machinery in working condition, to the State Government for the community benefit. The mill museum used to open for visits until the structures had deteriorated to a point when it became a hazard. A tall fence runs all around the facility, with noticeboards warning of dangers lurking within posted all along the fence.

The village was built in 1950s for the workers at the Bunnings Brothers timber mill. It had 35 workers' cottages, school, butcher shop and a general store. Nowadays, cyclists, walkers and motorised tourists have replaced workers and their families. The cottages are used for accommodation, the school building has become a bunk-house for Bibbulmun track walkers and Munda Biddi cyclers, the butcher shop is a school holiday screening theatre while the general store, the village's focal point, has become a café, a social gathering place and a store for visitors and guests.

The café front was very busy with emus and kangaroos anxious for food handouts (bags of feed can be bought in the store). Other wildlife, like possums, kookaburras, magpies, parrots and blue fairy wrens, have also been reported visiting cottages. Another point of interest, for kids in particular, is the 50 metre flying fox sprung under the tall karri trees in the middle of the village.

This is a beautiful spot to visit and stay for those wishing to escape the modern life; there is no mobile phone coverage, and the only sounds that can be heard are the nature's ones. From the village, Steve took us to the nearby dam, where we sat for lunch. The dam, which is only five minutes walk from the village, is used both for swimming and canoeing as well as village's water supply.

During the lunch, we discussed the today trip's next leg. Back at the camp, Steve got from Don (the non-WW camp resident) coordinates of a notorious local spot. It was an old farm said to be haunted by ghosts of two brothers who at the beginning of the 20th century drained a swamp in the area and farmed potatoes. In 1907, at the time of a potato glut, brothers' fortunes turned from bad to worse and one of the brothers shot the other, then killing himself.

After the lunch, Steve led us to the spot marked by the coordinates he got from John. We parked our cars by the edge of what looked like it once was a cultivated field and which now turns into a swamp during wetter months. The area, outlined by decaying timber fence posts and taller shrubbery, was overgrown with scented weeds and low bushes. The troupe embarked on to the search for the farmhouse remains and the elusive fig tree that we were told was growing on the farm, but found nothing except few overgrown drainage canals, a rusty hopper and remains of an old stock loading ramp. Both the house and the fig tree had eluded us.

Back at the camp, it was happy hour time, and while the ladies were engaged in a lively conversation, men were working out the finer points of the OziExplorer navigation aid, with Paul Di Giorgio taking up the challenge of making it work on Steve's laptop with the help from Tony's map set. Allan took out the bright yellow Wanneroo Wanderers banner and set it up between two appropriately spaced trees.

As the evening was getting cooler, few couples sought protection under blankets after dinner, while the conversation in the camp continued for a while.

Sunday, 3 March

Kookaburras and cockatoos announced another crisp morning and a couple of walkers set on a four-hour walk, taking Bibbulmun Track's south route. They planned to be back in the camp by lunchtime and, to join the group for the afternoon drive. When they returned to the camp at around 11:30, Kerri and Steve were already back from their bike ride on Munda Biddi trail and Steve had a story to tell.

On the way back from their ride, Kerri and Steve found two cars parked in the middle of the camp, the twin-cab ute's canopy open. Two men were (it looked like) checking one of the aft tyres pressure, while two women were looking on. They were waiting for Kerrie and Steve to continue their ride, but when they didn't, the two cars left. Was it a genuine stop to check the tyres, or an opportunistic attempt to relieve us of some of our belongings?

While the cyclists and walkers were on their morning explorations, Leslie and Bob had packed their tent and left to visit Bob's relative in Donnybrook, and Sue and Don had also packed up and left for their next destination.

The rest of campers joined together for a trip to Bridgetown, to test the Blackwood River waters with their kayaks. Don had given Paul Di Giorgio the updated ghost farm coordinates, so, after Bridgetown, the group followed the route to the haunted spot and came back to the camp to report that, not so far from where we were searching yesterday, they had found few rocks, possibly the homestead remains, and the fig tree, but no figs.

A young couple, Joey and Nash, with two sons arrived in the early afternoon and after pitching their tent in almost the same spot were Leslie and Bob's had theirs, left to check the sights.

As there were still few hours left in the afternoon, Kerri and Steve together with Audrey and Vlado went to try some of the tracks, hoping for a challenge. Steve took us to the powerline track that runs north of the camp, stretching kilometres towards Nannup. The track was well graded and seldom used. Fortunately, the sloped sections had deep ruts cut by rainwater, so

we did have a bit of fun. To top it all, at one point we had to leave the powerline track, as the way ahead was signposted as being reserved, and took a downward slope with only ruts and no track. All ended well and Vlado didn't embarrass Pajero. We continued to drive around on fairly good logging tracks, up and down the hills forested with pine and karri before returning to the camp for our last happy hour.

The weather was warming and the conversation was flowing, helped by pizzas, non-gluten and otherwise, baked by Mirella and Jenny. After the dinner, the group met again at and continued with the conversation. The night was pleasant and bright, and the sky above lit by distant satellites and crisscrossed by low flying bats.

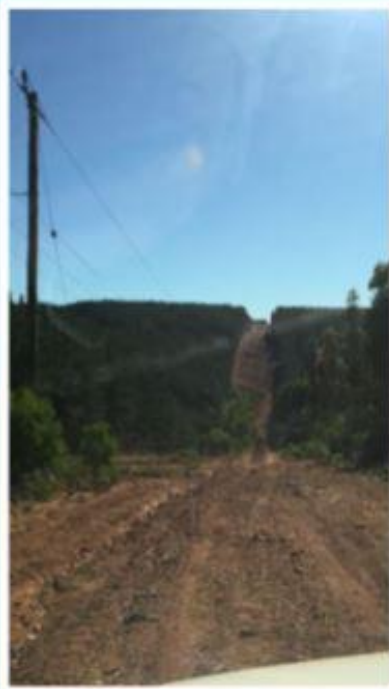

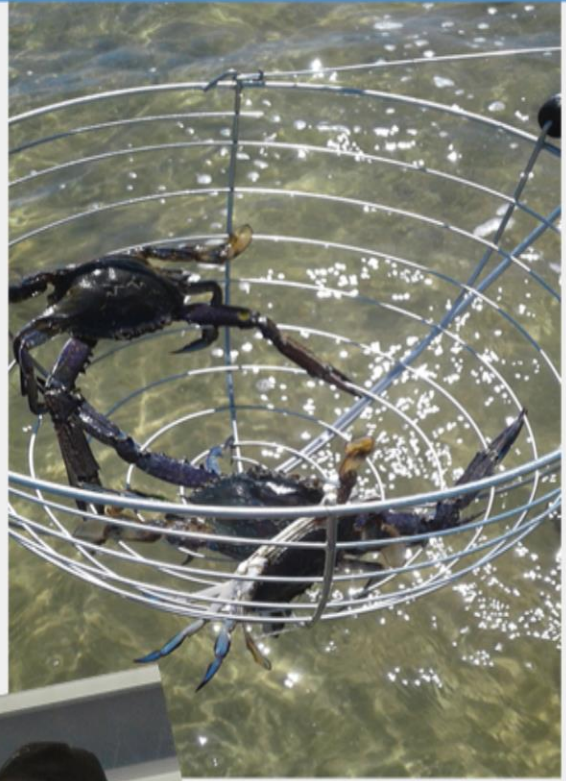

- Over best score: Steve & Phil - tied on 46 Woo Hoo...Champions till 2020

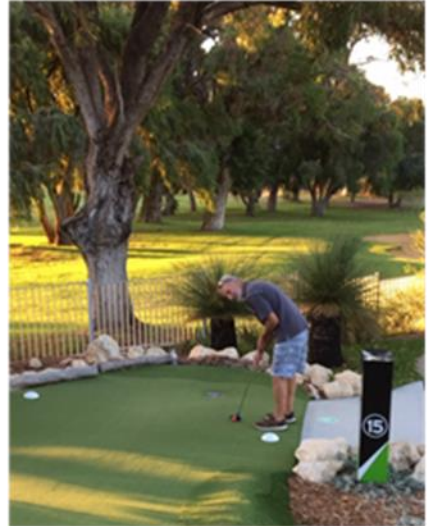
All agreed a great new event, together with excellent food, drink.

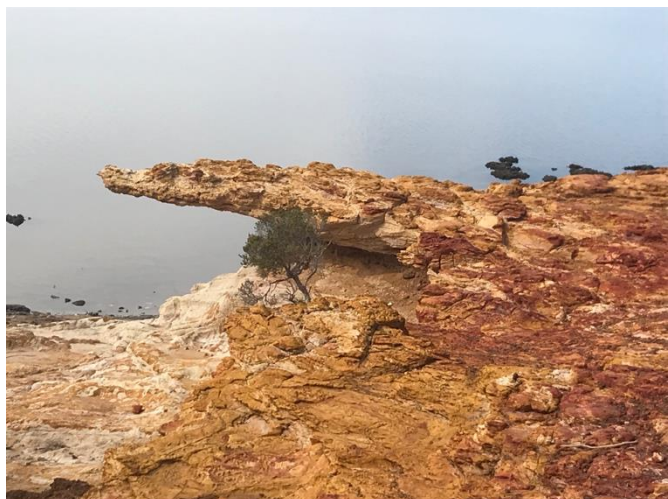

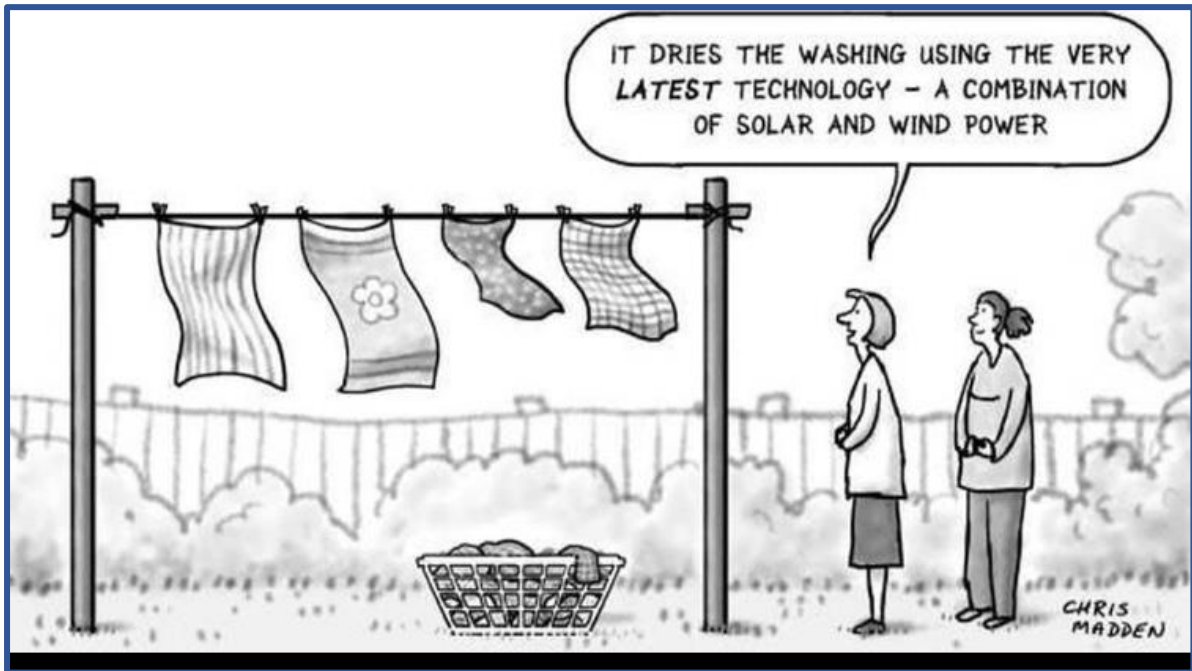
the coals still warm, it only took a minute or two to get it going for another lovely evening around the campfire.

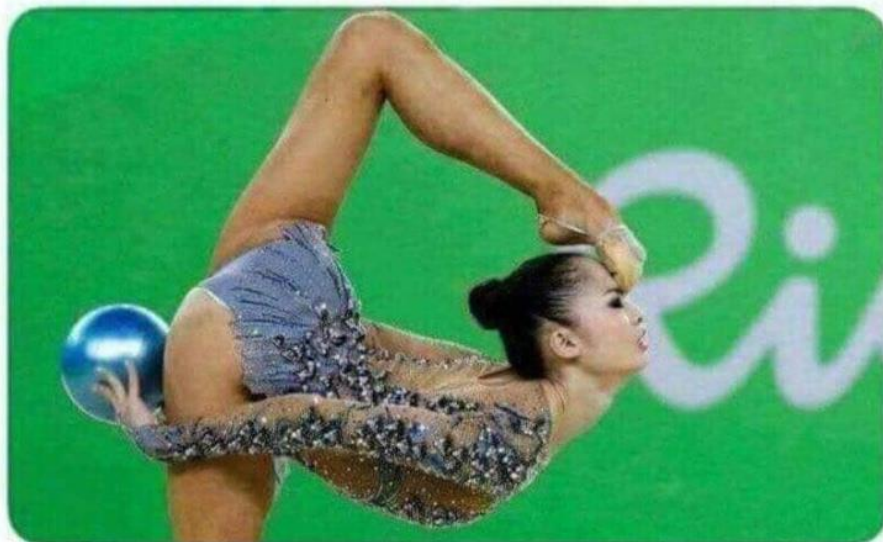

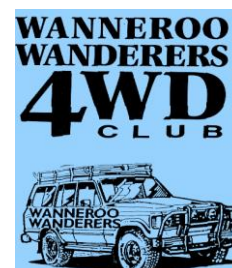
