CONVOY PROCEDURE

1. Fuel tanks must be filled prior to start of trip.
2. Before moving off from a designated departure point the trip leader will appoint a tail-end charlie.
3. At **All** turn-offs, vehicles shall wait until the following vehicle is aware of the former's intention. Periodical checks for the following vehicle must be made as per convoy procedure.
4. Persons leaving the club convoy **MUST** notify the trip leader and if possible give details of their intentions.
5. No vehicle in the convoy is to pass the lead vehicle.
6. When travelling in convoy on the open road, the distance between vehicles shall not be less than 6 vehicle lengths, and keep the vehicle behind in sight at reasonable intervals.
7. At nature stops the rule to be followed is ladies to the left - gents to the right.
8. In recovery procedures to avoid injury to personnel the drivers of the vehicles involved shall ensure that the immediate area is cleared.
9. All persons travelling in convoy must be inside a vehicle

CODE OF ETHICS

1. Obey restriction on use of public lands. Respect national parks and other conservation areas, (i.e. Calm, Water Authority, Fire Authorities).
2. Obtain permission before driving on private land. Leave livestock alone and gates as found.
3. Keep to existing tracks where possible.
4. There shall be no deliberate destruction of trees, shrubs or wildlife. Respect our wildlife, stop, look and observe but never chase animals.
5. Use a well worn campsite to minimise impact on the environment.
6. No firearms to be displayed or used in campsite or prohibited areas.
7. No unofficial competition or displays of "4WDing" shall take place during trips without permission of the trip leader.
8. At club functions members shall obey verbal instructions and visual signs erected by the organisers.
9. Drive very slowly within camp area.
10. When answering the calls of nature, members are asked to take the shovel and bury the result at all times, Ladies are respectfully requested to dispose of their paper hygienically. (i.e. rubbish container or campfire).
11. Keep the environment clean. Be prepared to carry out all the rubbish you take into unserviced areas.
12. All members are requested to comply with the above codes.

Wilbinga Sunday 22nd October

For a week leading up to the trip the weather forecast was not pretty and would have kept most away, but the few hardy souls who put their hand up were rewarded with a beautiful sunny day out on the dunes.

We hope you enjoy the adventure of discovering this beautiful property.
For the safety and enjoyment of all visitors and to preserve the tracks and campgrounds for the future, please observe the following conditions. If you have any specific questions please don't hesitate to ask.

CAMPING

There are lots of lovely places to camp. We will provide you with a map and some guidance about where you can camp when you arrive.

Downstream from the homestead there is a designated Shire Reserve 200m from the rivers edge. Camping is prohibited within this reserve. Please don't camp within 200m of the water's edge. If we see you camped on the Reserve, we will have to ask you to move your camp.

Leave all gates as exactly as found. Do not camp near stock watering points.
Quad bikes or dirt bikes are not permitted.
Firearms are also not permitted.

CAMP FIRES: Small, closely guarded fires are permitted except when the fire warning is very high or extreme. Fire bans are in place - 15 October - 1 March.

FISHING- is strictly prohibited *upstream(east)* from the homestead

RUBBISH- PLEASE do not litter!! You are required to take your rubbish with you.
Toilet paper- is unsightly and unhygienic so **PLEASE** do not pollute the camp grounds!! We prefer that you bring your own camping toilet, but alternatively please bury your waste.

Murchison House Station is a 350,000 acre (126,000 hectares) working station originally established by Charles von Bibra in 1858. We have lived on the property since 1997 and are the current owners and managers. Our primary industry is the trapping and selling of rangeland goats. Every summer we muster or trap up to 5000 goats. We also run a small herd of cattle as well. Tourism has become an increasingly significant part of our business. In addition to camping and 4WD access, quad bike tours, sand boarding and canoe safaris also operate from the homestead.

4WD ACCESS

Before leaving the homestead engage 4WD and reduce tyre pressure to 25psi.
Do not exceed 40km per hour driving around the Station, and beware of blind corners and oncoming vehicles.
Drive slowly over the causeway and through the homestead - **8km/hr through the homestead- VERY SLOW!!**
Arrivals for bush camping must be during office hours. **All** vehicles are required to register. Vehicle access through the homestead is restricted between **9pm and 7am**. That means access over the cause-way during these times is for emergencies only.

BE PREPARED: You are entering remote wilderness areas. It is your responsibility to carry adequate water/ supplies/ first aid/ recovery equipment. **Stay on well-defined tracks.** If in doubt as to the suitability of the track or the capability of the vehicle/driver **GO BACK.**
Do not make any new tracks.

MHS is a working cattle and goat station. All tracks have been produced to facilitate station management. 4WD experience is required. Incidental damage to vehicles is possible.

Murchison House Station Management does not accept responsibility for loss, damage or injury. 4WD access is granted on the condition that visitors understand and accept this.

A MINIMUM \$250.00 CALL OUT FEE APPLIES TO ALL VEHICLES REQUIRING ASSISTANCE. RECOVERY FROM THE BEACH OR RIVER BED IS A MINIMUM \$500.00 FEE

When leaving please return the map to the office and be sure to sign out.
IN CASE OF EMERGENCY DIAL 000.

OFFICE HOURS: Times for office hours can vary and are noted on the board outside the office. Please make enquiries during those times by ringing the bell. When the office is closed the bell may be rung in an emergency.

- BASIC TOOL KIT TO SUIT VEHICLE
- JACK, JACK HANDLE, JACKING PLATE
- WHEEL BRACE
- 10BE FIRE EXTINGUISHER
 - (BFE Type fitted to vehicle within easy access to driver)
 - FIRST AID KIT
 - SPARE RADIATOR HOSES AND FAN BELTS
 - JUMPER LEADS
 - WATER (Enough to REFILL cooling system)



ADDITIONAL EQUIPMENT
