CONVOY PROCEDURE

- 1. Fuel tanks must be filled prior to start of trip.
- 2. Before moving off from a designated departure point the trip leader will appoint a tail-end charlie.
- 3. At **All** turn-offs, vehicles shall wait until the following vehicle is aware of the former's intention. Periodical checks for the following vehicle must be made as per convoy procedure.
- 4. Persons leaving the club convoy MUST notify the trip leader and if possible give details of their intentions.
- 5. No vehicle in the convoy is to pass the lead vehicle.
- 6. When travelling in convoy on the open road, the distance between vehicles shall not be less than 6 vehicle lengths, and keep the vehicle behind in sight at reasonable intervals.
- 7. At nature stops the rule to be followed is ladies to the left gents to the right.
- 8. In recovery procedures to avoid injury to personnel the drivers of the vehicles involved shall ensure that the immediate area is cleared.
- 9. All persons travelling in convoy must be inside a vehicle

CODE OF ETHICS

- 1. Obey restriction on use of public lands. Respect national parks and other conservation areas, (i.e. Calm, Water Authority, Fire Authorities).
- 2. Obtain permission before driving on private land. Leave livestock alone and gates as found.
- 3. Keep to existing tracks where possible.
- 4. There shall be no deliberate destruction of trees, shrubs or wildlife. Respect our wildlife, stop, look and observe but never chase animals.
- 5. Use a well worn campsite to minimise impact on the environment.
- 6. No firearms to be displayed or used in campsite or prohibited areas.
- 7. No unofficial competition or displays of "4WDing" shall take place during trips without permission of the trip leader.
- 8. At club functions members shall obey verbal instructions and visual signs erected by the organisers.
- 9. Drive very slowly within camp area.
- 10. When ansereing the calls of nature, members are asked to take the shovel and bury the result at all times, Ladies are respectfully requested to dispose of their paper hygienically. (i.e. rubbish container or campfire).
- 11. Keep the environment clean. Be perpared to carry out all the rubbish you take into unserviced areas.
- 12. All members are requested to comply with the above codes.

WHICHER RANGE TRIP -LONG WEEKEND - SEPTEMBER 2018

Friday 21 September

Saturday 22 September

Through a bit of mud and then down Tame Road to Great North Road and a short stop for a paddle in a cold Margaret River at Rapids crossing before proceeding on down Mowen Road to the store for some milk an ice cream and some lollies.

After lunch and a brief stop in the town of Margaret River it was on to the Millers Farm Cafe in Cowaramup for one of their delicious ice creams each before the convoy took a roundabout way back to camp through bush tracks observing a large ostrich in a paddock on the way.

Monday 24 September


Off home for Paul, Mirella, Alan, Alison, Paul, Debbie, Barb, Chris, Cara and family with a leisure day for those that stay.



KULIN BUSH RACES trip OCTOBER 4-7, 2018

What a fun weekend that was! The Kulin Bush Races had been suggested several times for the club calendar but either rarely happened or had a very small turnout. Now I'm sorry we never had the chance or made a bigger effort to go before.

This was the first trip for our new caravan so being with a convoy of vans was a good safety net to have. We arranged to meet Joe & Elisa, Kym & Glenda and Marian & Keith in Williams for lunch on the Thursday. The drive from Mandurah up the hill to Dwellingup and then through the rolling hills and winding roads out to Williams was a new experience towing a much larger caravan than I was previously used to. It was a little unnerving to start with and slow and steady was the order of the day. Both the Pajero and the driver did a little more work than normal!

All the gang arrived in Williams at about the same time and we made contact on CH14 to arrange a lunch stop at the Woolshed. We were greeted in Williams by the police doing random breath tests. Keith had to do two tests in two minutes as he had to make a u-turn to join us. Despite his protest that he had just done one, the same policemen tested him again because... "we're instructed to test every driver that comes through the stop". Fortunately Keith hadn't consumed a six-pack in the intervening two minutes.

A few of us decide to buy a light lunch at the Woolshed cafe. While the food was very nice, I think we could have whipped up a 3 course meal in the caravan in a much shorter time. In fact it took so long the police had packed up their RBT and moved on. After being fed and watered we headed on down the road to Kulin. The transit area and caravan park in Kulin were very full with people waiting for the races. We continued on through the town and along the Tin Horse Highway for about 14km to the racecourse.

The races admission cost included two nights camping on the Friday and Saturday nights. None of us had been to Kulin Races before, so we had no idea how busy it would be, how big it was, what facilities were there or what the camping arrangements were. We decided arriving a day early would let us beat the crowds in. So did lots of others - There must have been at least 500 tents/vans/motorhomes already in place in the campground, which was basically a large farming field (maybe 50-100 acres) that had been slashed down to stubble level. It was a lovely setting in between two large granite outcrops and on the edge of a white saltlake. There were several portable toilet blocks and even a few basic showers with hot water.

There were no instructions other than "park anywhere you like" and "don't reserve places for others". It was a bit confusing as there were lots of areas roped off but had no signage on them. We later figured out that was early campers ignoring instruction 2. Eventually we found a good spot down on the fence line near the lake and circled the wagons – or more correctly, 'squared the wagons'. That gave us nice private shared area between the vans and a perfect place for the campfire.

Thursday night was Karen's birthday so we had the mandatory birthday cake and song. On Friday morning we headed back into town to look at the dozens of tin horse sculptures more closely and take pictures of them. Most were very clever and funny. In town there were lots of interesting activities such as the motor/farm museum, arts & craft displays, and CWA morning tea. The CWA hall was very, very busy and we paid our \$5 to have a cuppa and delicious homemade scones and cakes. I overheard one of the poor overworked lady helpers complain "I'm supposed to be a farmer not a bloody waitress!".

Back at camp on Friday evening, Bob & Leslie had arrived and set up tent near the main events area. We all went to check out the food, drink and entertainment venues to see what was in store for the weekend. In the main tent, there was a mature-aged lady playing the saxophone and she had a huge repertoire of songs across all eras and genres – I don't know how she remembered so many lyrics. Interestingly her act was called "Sax and the Single Girl". She could carry a tune, play the sax really well and was full of energy – very entertaining and she played for hours.

Friday also saw the huge influx of campers and the farm area filled up quickly. It was quite a sight from the top of the rock outcrop - a vast sea of tents, campers and caravans. The organisers said it was the best attended yet with well in excess of 4,000 people attending, easily beating last year's record of 3,900.

Saturday was the big race day. There was the grand parade (of 4 vehicles), a Scottish pipe band (I love those bagpipes) and a number of the racehorses on show. It's a real fun program with most horses running in two races, many of the horses in the 15-18yo age bracket and even a race for jockeys over 80kg. There were also novelty events like around-the-barrel rodeo riding, painted sheep races, dog races, children's races and tug-of-wars. The sheep were hilarious, leaping and bounding out the stalls, running halfway down the track and then stopping in a flock not knowing where to go next.

Getting into the spirit of the day, Karen, Glenda and Elisa donned their fancy race dresses, fascinators and brightest wellie boots. They looked such an elegant trio stomping through the dusty paddock in their wellies and attracted lots of looks and photo requests. We heard one old farmer ask his wife, "Is that really the new fashion these days??".

The first horse race set the scene for my betting success for the day. My horse was leading all the way until the last corner, when it decided it had had enough, turned right instead of left and headed back towards the stables!!! The jockey eventually managed to turn it around and came past the post about a minute after the others – hilarious. I never picked a winner for the whole day. Unlike Karen's brother Paul, who arrived first thing Saturday morning just before race 1 and picked the first 3 winners in a row to pocket a tidy \$90 to start the day off nicely.

The day continued well with entertainment by a local band, Sax and the Single Girl and the Scottish Pipe Band. Food and drink outlets were very popular as were the betting lines. Luckily the sun shone for the whole day although the wind was a bit chilly at times and I needed to scrounge Leslie's crocheted blanket for a while to stay warm. Apparently we had some of the best weather they have seen for some time at the races.

Saturday night saw a huge fireworks display which seemed to go on forever. We watched it from back at the campsite by the warmth and comfort of our private campfire. In the distance I could hear the main act playing loads of great Aussie and British songs. I thought at the time they sounded pretty good but didn't find out until the next day they were a group of 4 musicians from some well-known and successful Aussie bands (Powderfinger, Jets, Spiderbait and You am I). I wished I had taken the time to go and watch them perform up close. I'll pay more attention and keep an eye out for them next time.

Sunday morning saw the packing up and mass exodus of thousands of caravans. We expected that so many people leaving in short space of time on a single country road would have caused a huge traffic jam. But in fact it went very smoothly and there were no holdups whatsoever.



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Four Wheel Drive and Camping Show November 16-18, 2018

Our club has often discussed having a Wanneroo Wanderers stand at the 4WD show in past years but had trouble getting sufficient volunteers to commit to preparing material and manning a dedicated stand for 3-4 days. This year the WA 4WD Association offered to provide a general area inside the Association tent for smaller clubs to be represented. A fairly last-minute decision was made at the November monthly meeting to take up this offer.

The aim of our presence at the 4WD show was to try to attract new members to the club. Membership turnover has seen the club numbers drop progressively over the past few years and we need new people to ensure the club remains viable and active. More retired members travelling extensively can also make it difficult to have sufficient numbers for some events and trips.

Kym Batten in his usual pro-active and efficient style quickly put together an attractive coloured brochure outlining our club's details, code of ethics, meeting details and contact information. He also produced an entertaining short promotional video showing some of our past trips. The Association played that video on a continuous loop along with other club's videos throughout the weekend.

Our stand was manned in turn on Friday by Archie Lind, John Lyford and Steve Morris. Steve also assisted with some driving sessions on the 4WD track. On Saturday, Steve & Kerry Waterman and Tony & Jenny Downe manned the stand. On Sunday it was Alan Wyatt and Mark Bolton. Thanks to all of these people for taking their time to help promote or club.

The Association tent was well visited by the public looking for information on the recently announced opening of the MundAl 4wd track. This is an 820km route of unsealed roads and tracks from Mundaring to Albany. I'm not sure how the track was publicised but almost everyone we spoke to in the tent was there to find out about it. The video presentation about the track was very interested and was introduced by Emma George (WA Olympic pole-vaulter). She and Mark Skeels were the people in the video showing a camping trip on section of the track, explaining how to obtain the track waypoints from the WA 4WD Association website and what to expect on the trip. It is certainly something our club could look at for trips over the next couple of years.

The advantage of being in the Association tent rather than on a dedicated club stand, is we managed to speak to quite a few people who weren't there to actually looking for information about a club. On a personal level, while the number of visitors wasn't large, I managed to have extended conversation with four prospects from the northern suburbs that seemed quiet interested. I think John and Steve also had some prospects. I'm not sure about Saturday or Sunday attendances. Whether that translates to further inquiries or visitors at our monthly meetings remains to be seen.

Interestingly, most people I spoke to were in roughly the same age group as our current membership. Younger people didn't seem to be interested in the 'formality' of a club, preferring to do their own thing or have a more casual arrangement to trips with friends and acquaintances via social media. I'm not sure how we can tap into this or even if that suits our club at all.

I also spoke to quite a few representatives of other clubs that had stands at the show. All of them are experiencing exactly the same issue as our club with respect to ageing and falling memberships. Some car-centric clubs such as the Mitsubishi club have relaxed the criteria and allow any type of vehicle now. Landcruiser Club and LandRover clubs are trying to hold firm at the moment. A couple of the clubs are now looking to amalgamate to survive or actually close down altogether. So it seems like many of the clubs are struggling to resolve the same problems we are facing and none of us seem to have come up with a decent solution or action plan. Where to from here?, I'm not sure......

All in all another great social event with the Wanneroo Wanderers.


