CODE OF ETHICS

1. Obey restriction on use of public lands. Respect national parks and other conservation areas, (i.e. DPAW, Water Authority, Fire Authorities).
2. Obtain permission before driving on private land. Leave livestock alone and gates as found.
3. Keep to existing tracks where possible.
4. There shall be no deliberate destruction of trees, shrubs, or wildlife. Respect our wildlife, stop, look, and observe but never chase animals.
5. Use a well-worn campsite to minimise impact on the environment.
6. No firearms to be displayed or used in campsite or prohibited areas.
7. No unofficial competition or displays of "4WDing" shall take place during trips without permission of the trip leader.
8. At club functions members shall obey verbal instructions and visual signs erected by the organisers.
9. Drive very slowly within camp area.
10. When answering the calls of nature, members are asked to take the shovel and bury the result at all times. Ladies are respectfully requested to dispose of their paper hygienically. (i.e. rubbish container or campfire).
11. Keep the environment clean. Be prepared to carry out all the rubbish you take into un-serviced areas.

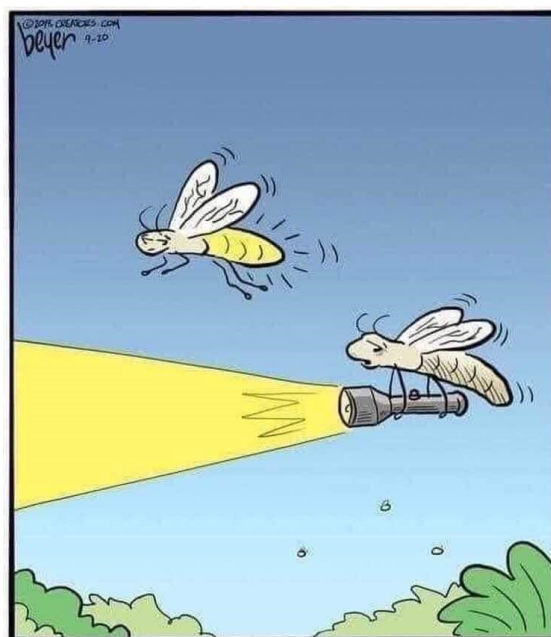

CONVOY PROCEEDURE

1. Fuel tanks must be filled prior to start of trip.
2. Before moving off from a designated departure point the trip leader will appoint tail-end Charlie.
3. At all turn-offs, vehicles shall wait until the following vehicle is aware of the former's intention. Periodical checks for the following vehicle must be made as per convoy procedure.
4. Persons leaving the club convoy MUST notify the trip leader and if possible, give details of their intentions.
5. No vehicle in the convoy is to pass the lead vehicle.
6. When travelling in convoy on the open road, the distance between vehicles shall not be less than six vehicle lengths and keep the vehicle behind in sight at reasonable intervals.
7. At nature stops the rule to be followed is ladies to the left - gents to the right.
8. In recovery procedures to avoid injury to personnel the drivers of the vehicles involved shall ensure that the immediate area is cleared.
9. All persons travelling in convoy must be inside a vehicle

LESSONS LEARNED, OBSERVATIONS, WHAT WE WOULD OR WOULDN'T DO AGAIN

I thought I would put together a series of short notes about events on our recent 5-month trip across the top of Australia. Also to add some content for our club magazine.

I am sure some of the stories will stir up debate, but that is more or less the point of it.

First to frame the scenes for these stories. The trip started in early May and concluded in early October. We left on a rainy weekend and returned on a rainy weekend, with barely any rain in between. We had a week in South Lefroy Bay Ningaloo, a few days in Millstream Chichester NP and two wonderful weeks on the Dampier Peninsula. From there we met up with Richard Dettmer and tackled the infamous Gibb including the Mitchell Falls. From there it was onto Darwin taking in Litchfield NP (my favourite) and Kakadu. Then it was the Savannah Way through Roper Bar (very interesting/ underwhelming) Boorooloa, Hells Gate, Burketown and onto Cape York (roughest road I've ever been on) unfortunately we had to come back down the same road. A couple of weeks in the Atherton tablelands then down through outback Queensland via Winton and Boulia (no Min Min lights to be seen) to Birdsville for the iconic races (what a hoot that was) Home via the Birdsville track, Flinders Ranges and the York Peninsula. 25,000km probably 8,000 of that on dirt.

Phew, I tried to keep it brief.

As you all know, our van is not exactly Off Road but Mark Henderson and Paul Di Georgio had done some major improvements to it before we bought it from Mark. Just as well, because we took the poor old van down some very rough roads.

On upgrades on the Hilux, either stock standard except for an extra leaf added to the rear suspension.

My thinking on that was after this trip I would certainly know where the weaknesses are and I would address them, luckily nothing Hilux factory broke on the car, but I did need to tighten the tub bolts down on one occasion, one was almost ready to drop out. Near the end of the Gibb my Tracklander tradies roof rack had come loose. The aluminium Unistrut had started to crush under the weight of two spare tyres and the 360 awning. I made a temp repair at Home Valley Station and a permanent one in Kunnunarra. My water tank in the tub also came loose and had to be bolted back in. Quite a bit of dust ingress in the ARB canopy, so further dust proofing required there.

Apart from some of the accessories fitted the Hilux came through with flying colours.

The caravan, less dust in the van than I expected, some days were worse than others. Not sure why, but mostly on the dirt roads dust inside was minimal. One day while we were on the Gibb I opened the Scupper hatch on the roof to see how that would work, all good, no more or less dust than normal. Thumbs up. But when I tried it again a few days later, big thumbs down, lots

of dust inside. Didn't do that again. Another time the outer door did not latch properly at the bottom and again a lot of dust inside. It does look like dust comes in where the walls meet the floor, especially in the cupboards around the wheel arches. Need to sort that out sometime. Generally, though, pretty happy. We met people along the way that had way more dust issues than us. Had a fridge door shelf break twice, the first time because we had too many full jars on it. The shower cubicle also moved. You would think it would be fixed to the floor somehow.

Now for the topic sure to stir up debate. When Judy and I were leaving Millstream there was a straight very corrugated road around 1km long, curious as to what happens in the caravan on rough roads, I grabbed the handheld and climbed into the van. When Judy started, the first thing I noticed was it is very noisy, not only road noise but pots and trays and other items rattling around. (we took the trays out of the oven after that exercise) It was a very rough ride inside the van up to around 40km per hr, it smoothed out and was pretty good at around 60-70kph, and again very rough when slowing down through 40-0kph. Most surprising was the furniture, where it was fixed to the floor, it was going up and down about 6-7mm. On inspection the plastic angle brackets inside the cupboards had all broken.

Improvements made prior to the trip were pool noodles to all the exposed pipes under the van, extra fixings to hold the fridge in place (I had heard stories of fridges falling out) and I purchased a second hand set of Rock Tamers. Not entirely happy with them, still lots of stone damage under the van so sold them on when we got back.

All up our Windsor Rapid went everywhere much more expensive off-road vans went and more.

Tyres: Before we left, I got a new set of Toyo AT 2's on the car. I have had them before and was pretty happy with them. A friend also lent me his tyre pressure monitors (more on that later)

On the way into Millstream via Pannawonica I got my first puncture on the car, rear drivers' side. I picked up a hex head tek screw. Bad luck. Next day we went out to Python Pool. Quite a rough road and should have let my tyres down and didn't, so second puncture. A slit on the tyre from the very coarse aggregate. When we got to Karratha a few days later, the Tyrepower guy told me the Toyo's I had were totally unsuitable for where we were going, towing a van, and he talked me into at least upgrading the rear tyres to AT3's, which were light truck tyres and the AT2's were not. It made sense, so my near new Toyo's were replaced. 2 anyway. I may have been stitched up there. Nd I should have taken them with me as there was a \$50 disposal fee per tyre. I reckon he sold them on.

Some lessons learned there.

The tyre pressure monitors saved me there, probably would have damaged the tyres without them, and they are only the cheapy ones also. Saved me a tyre on the van also. I had a leaky valve and the monitor warned me before it was too late.

I was curious what tyres other drivers with vans had on their cars. At one off the water fall car parks along the Gibb I had a look around. A great number of vehicles there were near new and with factory tyres still fitted, and some had the not so unusual overweight van on the back. Obviously Light truck tyres are better, but essential?

Tyre pressures: A lot of people on our journey asked me what tyre pressures I run. When cold I had 28 on the front, 30 on the rear and the caravan. Lots of people said that was way to low. But the only punctures I got was when I had road pressure in the tyres. Around 42psi. Some people I met said tyre pressures on rough roads don't matter and they don't bother mucking around dropping their tyre pressures.

One example was the guy at the Boorooloola caravan park waiting for his appointment at the garage to fix his broken suspension in his cruiser and do repairs to various broken bits on his huge caravan. I rest my case on that one.

There are many more stories on that topic. Last one is a couple camped next to us at Seisia on Cape York. I overheard them saying that I had no idea about tyre pressures that my tyre pressures are miles too low. He looked like his were road pressure, maybe a bit less. Good luck to him.

What we would or wouldn't do again:

Not sure if I would drive those distances over that time frame again. 25,000km in 5 months. Almost \$10,000 in diesel, so that is \$500 per week, a fair wack out of the budget.

Loved everywhere we went, highlights would be Ningaloo, Dampier Peninsula, the Gibb experience, Darwin, Queensland in general, The Flinders and the Birdville races. (Already booked a week at Ningaloo prior to the Murchison trip in September)

Not sure if I would take the caravan over the Gibb again, and definitely not to Cape York even though we came back unscathed.

Next extended caravan adventures will be more focused on a particular state, probably Queensland or SA.

Probably next tyres I get for the car and caravan will be the Maxxis Raza, I had to get one for the caravan in Darwin and it has worn a lot better than the Toyo on the van.

Well, I'll wrap it up there, but as all you travellers know there are always many stories to tell.

I hope this inspires some of you to put your stories down and send them off to Pat and Dave to include in the magazine. I am sure a lot of you have many stories to tell.
